Presidents Report:

Helio again, and yes, we are producing the newsletter more frequently in order to address the continually growing news in the district. Several projects are moving forward, and please contact us with your input if you have any thoughts.

We have approached Council to call a meeting at the School for all interested parties to discuss the best approach to the commemoration of the 1813 crossing of the mountains. We will be giving you more information as it comes to hand.

The RTA has costed the highway upgrade at over two billion dollars, and I danesay that thinking caps will be donned to search out the next step. HHAG is lobbying for some immediate upgrades to increase safety, regardless of any decisions on the proposed new route or the timing of its construction. A geotechnical survey has been completed to allow further design work on the proposed new toilets at the school.

There are plans afoot to hold a vintage and veteran car display on August 6th, and to hold a local car tour in conjunction, as well as a Boot and Ute Sale.

Big Backyard planning continues, with things falling into place nicely at this point. We are looking for people to do many jobs, but one in particular is the greeting of patrons at the gate and handing out raffle tickets to folks as they enter, just an hour each will be a big help, and we'll have a carefully drawn up roster so you won't be asked to do more than you volunteer for. Please give us a call.

Finally, a huge thankyou to those folks who have been working very hard to continue to make things happen in the valley.

The Local Environment Plan

The Lithgow Council Local Environment Plan (LLEP) has been in the process of development for several years. This plan is an essential document that will set the guidelines for the management and development of our valley for the next twenty or more years. There are also some immediate issues associated with the highway upgrade that need to be addressed in the LLEP.

The Hartley Valley is a unique and very special place. It has an extraordinary ambience as a consequence of its geography and is filled with European and Indigenous heritage assets. The wealth of early European heritage assets dotted across the valley and the marks of early settlement left on the landscape make it quite unique. We need a land use strategy for this area that recognises the unique nature of the valley.

In a recent meeting between the Progress Association, the Hartley Highway Action Group and Neville Castle the Mayor of Lithgow and General Manager Roger Balley we were invited to make a submission raising issues relevant to the LLEP and its implications for the valley. To do that we are calling a meeting of interested valley residents for the afternoon of Saturday 19th june to workshop the issues that need to be taken into account in the future management of this valley. If you have an interest in the heritage of the valley, its rural charm or the beauty of its escarpment (or more importantly how the valley will be managed for future generations) please join us at 2pm at the Hartley Schoolhouse Hall for a three hour workshop to input into the development of the issues we need council to consider in the LLEP.

Hartley Appleseeds Play Group meet at the Hartley Old School, Tuesdays soam until Lapre. Contact Alison on 6351 4296 for more information.



For those brover amongst us there is even a picnic table set up! The Headstones make for interesting reading and highlight the families who first settled the region. There is even the 'celebrity grave' of Henry Lawson's father. Originally Larson (before becoming Lawson) the family made the long voyage from their Norwegian homeland to settle in the District – Grave 99 just another bit of the rich history that is Hartley.

Some 52 years ago Ron, Catherine and son Raphel moved from the famous Norton St Leichardt in Sydney out. to Little Hartley and founded the Talisman Gallery and Cafe. Ron had a thriving metalworking business (Ron is a qualified Blacksmith) and indeed he handmade the furniture for their home as well as providing unique furniture to Sydney stores - but quality of life called and hence the move to the Hartley District. Within 12 months Ron had transformed the premises on the GWH into a Gallery and Workshop that selfs locally and globally. Ron has always had an interest in symbols - Celtic, zodlac etc and you can see this in his work. More recently Ron has expanded into hand-crafted jewellery, stone statues and bronze figures all of which make for ideal gifts and remember Ron can arrange for them to be sent overseas. Such has been the favourable feedback on the jewellery that Ron is planning to have a Ladies Pizza and Jewellery night in the not too distant future (details will be published) - to give the community an excuse to come together and to showcase

his unique designs. Once able to purchase the adjoining block, to provide much needed car parking space, the Gallery was joined by the Calle (specialising in Gourmet Pizza's) run by wife Catherine and son Raphel and in keeping with the spirit of hand crafting, the doe for the pizzas is made fresh by hand every morning. Likewise the produce used is, where possible, sourced locally, organic and cooked in a traditional manner and in a traditional wood – fined pizza oven – the aromas are to die for! The team have lost count of the number of diners who have commented that the Talisman pizza is more italian than pizzas they have sampled in Italy!

The Cafe is open Thu - Sun 9 til 9 (7 days during holiday periods) and caters for gluten free pizzas as well.

Aldgate Gallery showcases works from local artists as well as Sydney, greater NSW and interstate. South Australian sisters Barbana Marvell and Ann Hider began the gallery thirty years ago, and present owners Duncan and Barbara Wass are keen to carry on the tradition of quality Australian work.

In June the gallery will be host its first solo exhibition by South Bowenfells landscape artist Garry Pettitt. The opening on Friday 61th June marks Garry's first showing for five years, and if his other shows are a guide, the exhibition will be sold out very quickly. He is becoming very collectable, and conveys the mist, light and shadows of Hartley with consummate skill. The Wasses met later in life, after pursuing very different careers. Duncan spent time as a civil engineering draughtsman, before taking to the stage. He worked with most major theatre companies in the country, as well as some film and television appearances. Barbara began in the travel industry, before moving to hospitality, and specialising in event coordination at Litianfels. After meeting, they taught English in Sanda, Japan for two years, before returning to Australia and beginning the Hartley adventure.

Since moving to the valley seven years ago, the Wasses have built a thriving business that is now widely recognised throughout the mountains, and far to the west, as one of the best of its type.

History Reborn



Located on the GWH Little Hartley, Ambermere House has undergone a transformation and on Good Friday quietly opened their doors once again to the public. First licensed in 1845 (and obviously built before then) by Joseph Collits, to coincide with the opening of Victoria Pass, the Inn (originally trading as The Rose Inn) was first licensed in 1846 and had several licensees until cease of trading in 1873 once travel by railway was introduced. The Collits family came to the Hartley district in the 1820's with Pierce Collits (Joseph's father) building one of the sarilest linn's in Australia – 'Collits Inn' (formerly known as The Golden Fleece). From 1873 – 2010 Ambermere served first as a School then as a private residence. The original kitchen (which stood separate from the main house) has been demolished early this century after serving as a private schoolhouse. All the other buildings have also been demolished as the city bricks made from the local city did not weather very well. The original handmade bricks can be seen in the remaining chimneys of what once was the original kitchen, which still stand today in the outdoor countyard. These bricks were stamped with a "C".

In 2007 Fiona and Sean Richardson and their children Callum (9), Aidan (7) and Elicise (2) moved from Mudgee to Little Hartley with a vision to bring to life the history and ambience of Ambermere through their seasonal menu that features local produce from the region. This is what was historically on offer to the traveller to Ambermere in the 1800's and is a great way to bring the history to life for their petrons to enjoy. Most of the wines and beers available at Ambermere are not generally found in the larger bottle shops and as a wine barriestaurant why not just drop in for a glass of the best the Central West has to offer in the magnificent outdoor eating area at the back. On 6 sores Ambermere is exquisitely finished in period fittings. Ambermere is open daily 8.30am to 5.30pm for morning and afternoon teas as well as lunch and Friday & Saturday 8.30am – late for Dinner. They will also do a take-away boffee in the mornings for those freeding to work.

History Reborn

Harp of Erin Gallery to Re-Open 21 May 2010 with the Opening Celebration on 29 May 2010

The Hartley District is bursting with activity and the re-opening of the Harp of Erin Gallery is just another example of how vibrant our Valley is. We have already 'met' the Ghosts of the Harp so perhaps its time to meet the history of the Harp of Erini

Built on 100 acres granted to Michael Flanagan, it was opened as an Inn to service the new Bathurst Road on February 13 1832 and named The Harp of Erit in memory of his Irish background. Flanagan held the licence until 1838 when Andrew Gardener became licensee. The building then became the property of William Lewington and from 1857 it became W. Lewington General Wholesale Store and Post Office (with an annual Post Master's salary of 12 pounds), and business was so brisk that records show it was not uncommon for them to take 100 pounds before breakfast! In 1882 Henry Williams became owner and the building remained in his family for almost 100 years. According to Post Master General records, at its closure in 1975, it was the oldest Post Office in continual operation in Australia.

The Inn is constructed of handmade, sundried bricks and time rendered to protect against erosion. The simber throughout is Australian cedar and the many 12 paned windows still hold the original hand made glass. The original store was constructed of wattle and daub and can be seen in a Halterman collection photo taken as he journeyed through Little Hartley in 1872, being eventually replaced by the current cedar built store, originally Balmain's Store at Hartley Valle (local legend tells us Henry won it in a poker game) when it was then became known as William's Store. The Harp of Entrinceived a Littingow Council Heritage Restoration Award in 1999 and it is #1/07/232/0006-00826 on the National Federal Heritage Commission database.

Currently owned by Joe and Carol Dicker, who fell in love with the old building when they came across it whilst on a country drive in 1976, determining at that moment that they should purchase it and live there. The building was, as these things happen, completely derelict and so began a lifetime job of restoration. The busy highway, so close to the building, does great damage to the delicate brickwork and The Harp needs a constant programme of upkeep. In 1999 the Dickers first decided that the only way to protect it for future generations was to open to the public, so, drawing on their combined artistic background (Joe as actor/singer and Carol as theatre director/producer) they opened the Harp of Enir Gallery in 2001.

Joe and Carol are very excited to be re opening the Gallery on May 21 as The Harp of Erin Gallery and Emporium. As well as a selection of paintings by respected local artists, the Gallery will feature beautiful and unique Victorian and Edwardian jewellery, as well as repro and vintage pieces. Original Art Nouveau Franch lithographs, vintage clothing, pottery and bric-a-brac.

Business hours are Friday to Sunday or by appointment on 0414714447 or 63552182.

With the official re-opening on May 29 Joe and Carol invite locals to 'drop in' at the Gallery at 5pm to toast the future of the Gallery and the village of Little Hartley.

They will also be putting up a 'What's On in Little Hartley' notice board on the shop front to display all manner of interesting information about our beautiful local area. So if anyone is planning a Birthday celebration, Christening, Fete, etc, they can let the whole world know by pinning a notice on the board.
