

## AUSTRALIAN NATIVES THAT GROW HAPPILY IN MID-HARTLEY

### up to 2 metres

Banksia spinulosa (Hairpin Banksia)

Banksia cunninghamii (local version of Hairpin Banksia)

Grevillea rosmarinifolia - attracts small birds and is fire-retardant - endemic to Hartley

Hakea dactyloides (Finger Hakea) - protect from hard frosts when young

Hakea propinqua (Needle bush) - prickly shelter for small birds

Callistemon citrinus (Red Bottlebrush) - protect from hard frost when young

Callistemon ? (Alpine Bottlebrush) - very hardy - yellow flowers

### 3-7 metres

Acacia rubida (Red Stemmed Wattle) - beautiful, graceful - protect from hard frost when young

Acacia pravissima (Ovens Wattle) - unusual triangular leaves - fire retardant

Eucalyptus stricta (Mountain Mallee Ash) - protect from hard frost

Hakea sericea (Bushy Needlewood) - protect from hard frost when young

Callistemon lineris (Narrow leafed Bottlebrush) - very hardy

### 9-12 metres

Acacia mearnsii (Late Black Wattle) - wind break for dry sandy conditions

Eucalyptus cinerea (Argyle Apple) - prone to insect attack - attractive leaves

Eucalyptus pauciflora (Snow Gum) - beautiful - firewood tree - hardy

Eucalyptus leucoxylon (Yellow Gum) - firewood tree - protect from hard frost

### 13-20 metres

Eucalyptus melliodora (Yellow Box) - firewood tree - protect from hard frost

Eucalyptus rubida (Candlebark gum) - firewood tree - hardy - branches drop

Eucalyptus sideroxylon (Ironbark) - firewood tree - protect from hard frost

Acacia melanoxylon (Blackwood) - long lived wattle - protect from hard frost

Casuarina cunninghamiana (River She-oak) - sound of the wind in the needles

### Over 20 metres

Eucalyptus dives (Broad-leafed Peppermint)

Eucalyptus radiata (Narrow-leafed Peppermint) - grows very tall
