## AUSTRALIAN NATIVES THAT GROW HAPPILY IN MID-HARTLEY

up to 2 metres <u>Banksia spinulosa</u> (Hairpin Banksia) <u>Banksia cunninghamii</u> (local version of Hairpin Banksia) <u>Grevillea rosmarinafolia</u> – attracts small birds and is fire-retardant – endemic to Hartley <u>Hakea dactyloides</u> (Finger Hakea) – protect from hard frosts when young <u>Hakea propingua</u> (Needle bush) – prickly shelter for small birds

<u>Callistemon citrinus</u> (Red Bottlebrush) – protect from hard frost when young <u>Callistemon ?</u> (Alpine Bottlebrush) – very hardy – yellow flowers

## 3-7 metres

<u>Acacia rubida</u> (Red Stemmed Wattle) – beautiful, graceful – protect from hard frost when young <u>Acacia pravissima</u> (Ovens Wattle) – unusual triangular leaves – fire retardant <u>Eucalyptus stricta</u> (Mountain Mallee Ash) – protect from hard frost <u>Hakea sericea</u> (Bushy Needlewood) – protect from hard frost when young

<u>Callistemon lineris</u> (Narrow leafed Bottlebrush) – very hardy

## 9-12 metres

<u>Acacia mearnsii</u> (Late Black Wattle) – wind break for dry sandy conditions <u>Eucalyptus cinerea</u> (Argyle Apple) – prone to insect attack – attractive leaves <u>Eucalyptus pauciflora (</u>Snow Gum) – beautiful – firewood tree – hardy <u>Eucalyptus leucoxylon</u> (Yellow Gum) – firewood tree – protect from hard frost

## 13-20 metres

<u>Eucalyptus melliodora</u> (Yellow Box) – firewood tree – protect from hard frost <u>Eucalyptus rubida</u> (Candlebark gum) – firewood tree – hardy – branches drop <u>Eucalyptus sideroxylon</u> (Ironbark) – firewood tree – protect from hard frost

<u>Acacia melanoxylon</u> (Blackwood) – long lived wattle – protect from hard frost <u>Casuarina cunninghamiana (</u>River She-oak) – sound of the wind in the needles

Over 20 metres <u>Eucalyptus dives</u> (Broad-leafed Peppermint) <u>Eucalyptus radiata (</u>Narrow-leafed Peppermint) – grows very tall
